

TJ WALKER ART SHOW


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In celebration of Youth Art Month in March, the middle school held a Highlight Art Show which featured drawings, watercolor paintings, dyed silk, and woven pieces.

HIGH SCHOOL CO-CURRICULAR HIGHLIGHTS



Sturgeon Bay High School has seen some amazing student accomplishments this year. Along with academics, we encourage students to explore and engage in extracurricular activities to enhance their high school experience and develop a variety of skills and interests. Whether it be athletics, fine arts, academic clubs, or interest activities such as fishing or chess clubs, we encourage all students to connect and be active in the wide variety of co-curricular offerings. Recently, our Mock Trial and Math teams celebrated success after months of dedicated preparation.

Sturgeon Bay High School's Mock Trial team earned their way to the State tournament for the first time in school history! The competition began with 95 schools across the state and the top 20 moved on to the State competition held at the Dane County Courthouse.

The competitions began Friday, March 3 and ran all day on Saturday, March 4. Sturgeon Bay, with a team of 1 senior, 3 juniors, 3 sophomores, and 5 freshmen, competed at the highest level. The team started off strong with a win over Whitnall on Friday. As Saturday's competition grew even more intense, the team performed extremely well. In all trials, our team was competitive and



ultimately finished 1-3. In addition, one of our freshmen participants was awarded Best Witness in the State competition and one of our Junior students was awarded Best Lawyer in his class! The team is coached by History teacher Mr. Blahnik and attorney Jon Pinkert, who we thank for their dedication to mentoring and preparing these students.



Sturgeon Bay High School's Math Team won its 22nd Conference Championship in a row! Both our Varsity and JV teams were undefeated! The team went on to win the State Math Title for Class B for the 2nd consecutive year and our 12th overall. Every student finished all-state. Thank you to coach Cliff Wind for his leadership and dedication and to all our math teachers who support our strong math program.

"WIN" TIME AT SAWYER ELEMENTARY

Sawyer Elementary staff are working hard to shift literacy instructional practices to help increase students' literacy skills. Teachers attended professional development training and learned about various literacy practices and the research and science behind them. As a result, modifications to literacy support systems are being made so that all students receive individualized instruction that best meets their needs.

At the start of this school year, a new intervention schedule was implemented called "WIN time," which stands for "What I Need". This time provides all K-2nd grade students with an additional 25-30 minutes of reading instruction with the assistance of our teachers, reading interventionists and literacy coaches. It is all hands on deck and the students are working hard!

To ensure each student receives the proper individualized instruction, the literacy team met early in the school year to analyze student data and create plans that involve a data-driven approach. We are excited to see

literacy learning gaps improve and to include enrichment opportunities for students who are advancing beyond the core classroom curriculum. We plan to continue to provide WIN time for all K-2 students next school year.

CROSSROADS FIELD TRIPS

We are very grateful for Sturgeon Bay School District's relationship with Crossroads at Big Creek. Our Sunrise Elementary students learn so much in this incredible outdoor classroom! In the fall, students learned about pollination and how animals adapt. They dug for artifacts with archaeologists and practiced throwing atlatls, which are similar to the spear sticks that Indigenous peoples of this area would have used to hunt.

In the winter, Sunrise students visited Crossroads again to learn about winter survival and



hibernation. They also enjoyed s'mores around a great big campfire. We are excited to move into spring and enjoy our annual Earth Day field trip to Crossroads. Students will learn about insects and aquatic life. They will also help remove invasive species and make art and fairy shelters out of materials they find in the woods.
