


Sturgeon Bay High School




TJ Walker Middle School (grades 6-8)

Finance, Facilities, & Operations

- Continue the short and long-term budget planning process as part of the operational referendum cycle in order to continue the educational programming and appropriate staffing the community has come to expect.
- Continue the comprehensive facility process we began in 2019 that the community supported through the April 2020 capital referendum and complete the construction process that resulted.
- Attract and retain quality staff by supporting growth, continual improvement, and leadership, as well as continuing to develop a compensation strategy which includes but is not limited to salary, health insurance, wellness, and a sustainable approach to post-employment benefits.
- Note: Navigate reopening procedures for the 2021-2022 school year, as needed.



- Our most recent operational referendum was approved by our voters in the spring of 2019. (2016, 2013, 2010, & 2007 prior to that.)
 - It was a three-year revenue limit override operating referendum,
 which expires at the end of the current fiscal year (June 30, 2022):

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$2.9 million (19-20)
$3.2 million (20-21)
$3.6 million (21-22)
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- We are now looking at a five-year revenue limit override operating referendum in April of 2022:
 - \$2.6 million (22-23)
 - \$2.9 million (23-24)
 - \$3.3 million (24-25)
 - \$3.5 million (25-26)
 - \$3.8 million (26-27)



- Let's dig into the numbers for the five-year revenue limit override operating referendum further and compare one year to the next.
- NOTE: While we need to ask for a set amount, the Board does not take the entire amount unless it is needed. For example, while up to \$3.6 million was approved for the current year's override amount, the Board "under levied" by \$813,147 since the entire \$3.6 million was not needed.





Do we ever look at comparable districts and how our performance and spending compare? Yes, we do. Here is a visual from our Forecast 5 analytics software which looks at *2019 data from peer group districts between 750 and 1,500 students (minus K-8 only districts), etc.

*Note: Report cards and testing did not occur as they typically would during the pandemic, so the most recent comparative data available in the analytics system was 2019 as opposed to 2021.

To close out the referendum portion of the presentation, let's cut right to it.

- "So, where's the possible 'cut list'?"
 OR put another way . . .
- "So, what does it really look like to try to cut that amount of money?"

The \$2.6 million in year one of referendum, is the <u>equivalent</u> of eliminating 43 positions just in year one (22-23), for example . . .

22 teachers (of a total of 104)



+ 18 support staff (teacher associates, custodians, etc.; of a total of 81)



+ 3 principals/directors/administrators (of a total of 10).



Then there would have to be <u>additional cuts in each year that follows</u>. This is not an acceptable option in the eyes of the Board of Education or Administration. Therefore, the Board has voted unanimously to go to the voters of the school district in the April 5, 2022, election.

Operations . . . Facility Updates

Capital Referendum Summary

- Facility study in spring & summer of 2019
- Community survey in the fall of 2019
- Capital Referendum approved by the voters in the spring of 2020
- Updates with the survey in the fall of 2021
- Work occurred from roughly December 2020 August 2021
 - All materials from the facility study and capital referendum process are still available on the district website.

Operations . . . Facility Updates

Robert H. Nickel Auditorium Project

- Bob had advocated for updating seating in the capital referendum process (flooring & seating approximately \$130,000)
- A steering committee has now been assembled; Board action was taken in February 2022.
 - The steering committee will examine a vision, opportunities, and pursue fundraising efforts. Stay tuned.
