n 2018, TJ Walker Middle School's science teacher Matt Propsom was inspired to share his passion for the outdoors with students. Sixth grade students were offered a new class called Outdoor Adventure to learn lifelong outdoor skills and earn DNR licensure in hunter's safety, boating safety, snowmobiling, and ATV.

Over the past several years, the momentum has grown beyond the classroom and now Sturgeon Bay Middle and High School students are involved in a club sport of trap. Each year the Clipper Clays club continues to improve and grow, from an original 32 students to now

nearly 60. "Seeing the interest from the students and the support within the Sturgeon Bay community, we as coaches felt this could be a really strong extracurricular program," says Coach Propsom, who is assisted by Scott Richard and Clint Henry.

Sturgeon Bay High School's junior varsity Clipper Clays group won the state championship, and the middle school team took second out of 2,000 participants. A high school participant shared, "You don't have to be the most athletic person like in some other sports, but you just have to concentrate and persevere and put a bad round behind you." Competitions take place on weekends, allowing student-athletes who are involved in other sports to participate. "Trapshooting over the last 10 years has been the fastest-growing sport in high schools across the country," Propsom said. "Currently there are over 3,000 kids in Wisconsin involved with it, and we are very pleased to offer this opportunity in Sturgeon Bay Schools."

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TJ WALKER MIDDLE SCHOOL FOCUSES ON POSITIVE SCHOOL CULTURE

Teachers at TJ Walker Middle School are making it a point of emphasis this year to recognize students for positive behaviors.

One initiative that has been given a bit of an upgrade this year is Clipper Cash. Clipper Cash is our school "currency" and is awarded for a variety of reasons, such as coming to class prepared, turning in assignments on time, participating in class discussions, and being involved in school activities. Students can use the currency to purchase snacks at the school store, buy raffle tickets for weekly prize drawings, and select classroom perks like using the teacher's chair or choosing songs for the class playlist.



In addition to Clipper Cash, the TJ Walker staff has started a new initiative this year called TJ Walker P.R.I.D.E. Each week, staff members are asked to identify students who excel in the areas of Positivity, Responsibility, Initiative, Determination, and Empathy. Staff members fill out a P.R.I.D.E. postcard for students, and the cards are read out loud and distributed at lunch on Fridays. Once a student earns all five letters, they will be eligible for a series of rewards, such as a Clipper Pride Shirt, a special breakfast, and an end of the school year field trip.

During the month of September, students at TJ Walker earned 5,839 in Clipper Cash and 101 different students earned P.R.I.D.E. certificates. Students are on pace to be recognized over 53,000 times this school year for being positive members of the TJ Walker community.

LITERACY WORK AT SAWYER

The start of the 2021-2022 school year marked the beginning of a literacy initiative for Sturgeon Bay School District. In the first year of this work, the staff at Sawyer Elementary School studied to gain knowledge about current literacy practices in the areas of phonemic awareness, phonics, and oral language through professional development. Teachers worked alongside a reading coach and literacy consultant to implement new instructional methods in classrooms.

Our district's literacy journey continues during the 2022-2023 school year. We remain focused on building teacher knowledge of vocabulary, comprehension, and fluency through professional development and support from a literacy coach. Furthermore, we are implementing a new phonics curriculum for grades K-2 and we are excited to see how this impacts student growth. Finally, we are working with new diagnostic assessments that provide specific data on all 4K-2 students. We are using this data to meet with all grade level teacher teams regularly to analyze student progress and ensure that we are meeting the literacy needs of all our students.
